

Open Letter to Dr. Abiy Ahmed, Prime Minister of Ethiopia

As private and concerned persons of Ethiopian origin in the Diaspora, we continue to be deeply disturbed by the escalation of human rights violations, the selective and deliberate incarcerations and harassments of Amhara journalists, current and ex-military officers, human rights advocates and young and promising political and civic leaders such as those who are affiliated with the Amhara National Movement and business women and men. We are outraged to learn that as of this writing, at least 18 Ethiopian Orthodox Christian churches have been burned to the ground. Numerous Christian leaders and spiritual teachers have been selected and murdered.

The overall trend in Ethiopia is ominous. Unless the root causes, such ethnic-feudalism and the ethnicization of politics that trigger ethnic and religious conflicts and massive displacements are addressed quickly and boldly now, ethno-nationalism and religious fundamentalism might in fact become unstoppable and lead the country to civil war, possible genocide and disintegration. The consequences of this divisive governance will have devastating impact not only for Ethiopia's 110 million people; but also, for the Horn and the rest of Africa. The Voice of America reported recently that extremist groups are now using Amharic speakers and jihadist propaganda to terrorize the Ethiopian people. There is ample evidence to suggest that Ethiopia is becoming a fertile ground for Al-Shabab, Alkaid-a, ISIS and other extremist and fundamentalist groups. The signatories who felt obligated to send this letter to you; and to alert the global community of the imminent danger Ethiopia faces are convinced that civil conflict will undermine regional and world peace; and stall Ethiopia's investment and sustainable development for decades to come. This alarming trend is diametrically opposed to the aspirational goals of respect for human rights, the opening and widening of political, civic, cultural and religious space that you espoused during the first months of your premiership. Signatories feel strongly that your government has squandered a once in a life time opportunity that emanated from the support of tens of millions of Ethiopians.

These millions had hoped and expected bold and far reaching structural and institutional changes.

Simply put, reverting back to the dark and repressive days of the TPLF or injecting a similar arrangement in its place is a slippery slope that Ethiopians had rejected.

The world recalls that hundreds of thousands of Ethiopian youth rose up in unison; and an untold number sacrificed their lives to usher in the change that enabled you to become Prime Minister. Reverting back to a failed and repressive policy will exacerbate an already volatile and tense environment. Ethnic cleansing and displacements of innocent people by their millions should not become an Ethiopian norm.

Selective accusations and incarcerations, reinstatement of states of emergency, charges of innocent young people for terrorism, the abrogation of due process of law, day light robberies of 20 bank branches, unfair and selective application of the rule of law based on ethnicity; and more critical, the denigration of Ethiopian national values and institutions and the disintegration of Ethiopia are taking place under your watch and the watch of the EPRDF that has been in power for more than a quarter of a century.

Dr. Prime Minister

In your capacity as the leader of your party, you are primarily responsible and accountable for the actions of the parties that constitute the EPRDF as well as for the federal officials and institutions that you oversee. At stake is the future of one of the most important ancient countries on the planet; and the future wellbeing of 110 million Ethiopians who need more inclusion rather than deep ethnic and religious division. Millions of Ethiopians and the world at large watched and appreciated you because you chose Ethiopia and Ethiopiawinnet over tribe and ethnic party affiliation. You admitted mistakes and released all political prisoners. You opened dialogue where none existed before. You encouraged independent media and journalism in a country where independent journalists such as Eskinder Nega were jailed for "terrorism."

You restored relations with Eritrea and encouraged regional peace and economic integration. You engaged in and played a substantive role in the settlement of conflicts in neighboring countries. You held forums and tried to bring civility in Ethiopian discourse. Your motto "Medemer/ መደመር" made you a sensational and aspiring leader overnight. You gave hope and projected an image of a better future for all Ethiopians. In turn, the Ethiopian people accepted and gave you respect for your aspirational goals. They also believed in you and trusted you for a sound reason, namely that you will leverage their support and trust to advance the common good with courage and determination. On our part too, we had hoped that your aspirational goals would be institutionalized and democratized for the betterment of Ethiopia.

The legacy you may want to leave is not to go back but to go forward by being steadfast, bold, inclusive and fair. On August 8, 2019, Just Security, a U.S. based online forum issued a compelling commentary on the government of Ethiopia entitled "To Be a True Reformer, Ethiopia's Abiy Must Commit to Human Rights Accountability." We draw your attention to a principle called accountability. "That Ethiopia should hold perpetrators accountable is, however, not just politically sensible; it is legally compulsory. As a party to the International Covenant on Civil and Political Rights, Ethiopia has a legal obligation to investigate allegations of violations of the Covenant, such as the reports of arbitrary or extrajudicial executions in Somali Regional State. As a party to the Convention against Torture and the African Charter on Human and Peoples' Rights, Ethiopia also has a duty to investigate and provide redress for the torture and cruel, inhuman or degrading punishment that its agents have inflicted upon thousands of Ethiopians. Moreover, Ethiopia has incorporated the treaties' prohibitions into its domestic legal code, recognizing that the federal government must investigate such human rights abuses even when they are happening at the hands of regional state authorities. Yet, despite these clear legal obligations, Abiy has thus far been silent on what steps his government will take towards accountability."

We acknowledge that there is a great deal that goes on behind the "curtain" in Ethiopian intrigue politics that we do not know. Nevertheless, it saddens us to observe that, not only has Ethiopia failed to bring many officials accused of crimes against humanity to justice; it continues to arrest and incarcerate numerous innocent people, including a pregnant woman. "If Abiy is to continue propelling Ethiopia towards compliance with international standards and be the great reformer he and his supporters envision, it is imperative that his government end impunity for egregious human rights abuses. To truly earn his reputation as a reformer, he must finally begin investigating, prosecuting, and ending the serious human rights abuses being committed in Ethiopia's prisons and by its security forces."

You were commended for your position on human rights. Against the accolade you received, human rights abuses have increased sharply following the June 22, 2019 assassinations in Bahir Dar and

Addis Ababa and the alleged coup d'état that followed. It frightens us that the dreaded and draconian Anti-Terrorism Proclamation imposed by the TPLF-dominated regime has been reinstated full force by the Oromo Democratic Party dominated government that you lead. To be specific, more than 400 police, current and retired military officers, youth, civic and political leaders and journalists are incarcerated. The vast majority of these are Amharas. In order to underscore the seriousness of the issue, a partial list of the names of political prisoners is incorporated into this open letter. We also wish to

bring to your attention and the attention of the global community specific names of journalists and civic leaders who have been identified by the Committee to Protect Journalists (CPJ) on August 20, 2019.

The latest wave of arrests is recognized by human rights organizations such as the CPJ, Amnesty International, Human Rights Watch, Freedom House and numerous other rights organizations that have been in the forefront in advancing human freedom and rights in Ethiopia for many decades. In an article entitled "Ethiopian Authorities Arrest Journalist Mesganaw Getachew After He Films Outside Court," CPJ urged the government of Ethiopia to "unconditionally release Journalist Mesganaw Getachew" who is affiliated with the weekly Ethiopis and was arrested on August 9, 2019 and is facing "allegation of contravening Ethiopia's Antiterrorism Proclamation." This Proclamation was used as a tool to arrest, incarcerate and torture innocent civilians before you took power more than a year ago. Another civilian, "Adam Wejera, a member of the Balderas Council" was also incarcerated and charged with terrorism.

Signatories believe that the pretext of these sweeping arrests and charges of innocent civilians, most of them Amharas, is "failed coup in the Amhara region." The state has yet to establish credible material evidence for these charges. "CPJ last month documented the arrest and detention of two media workers with the privately-owned Amharic language Satellite Radio and Television (ASRAT) media, Berihun Adane and Getachew Ambachew.... CPJ is also investigating whether the arrest of another journalist and Balderas movement member, Elias Gebru, also facing terrorism charges is connected to his journalism. Over 200 people were arrested in connection with the June incident." All these politically motivated incarcerations and charges contravene international human rights standards and counter your promising reform agenda.

Dr. Prime Minister

Signatories genuinely believe that you want to be remembered as someone who spoke from his heart; and not as someone only with good intentions. Within the same spirit as millions of Ethiopians and the world community, we are asking now what went "wrong" to change the reform process? How is it possible for the Ethiopian people to see a trend backwards? Why are some innocent young people jailed under the pretext of terrorism while others are granted a free ride to distort historical facts, promote hate, ethnic division, suspicion and ethno-nationalism calling Amharas "oppressors, chauvinists, murderers, colonialists" etc.? Why is the rule of law being applied selectively on the basis of ethnic and party affiliation? Why are Orthodox Christian churches being torched and Christian teachers and leaders being killed or persecuted? Is there a red line? Signatories appreciate the notion that leading a complex, ethnically polarized and conflict-ridden country could be a lonely, arduous, challenging and difficult task. The

journey will be less difficult if the government that you are leading recognizes that the vast majority of the population; and not ethno-nationalists and religious fundamentalists should be empowered to drive the political discourse and the change process. This where we ask for bold and courageous leadership. "If there is a will there is a way!"

Other countries that had gone through tumultuous times such as South Africa (Apartheid) Rwanda (genocide) and Nigeria (Biafra) have managed to transform themselves for the better in terms of peaceful coexistence. You may not have all the answers to bring about peace to our country and peaceful coexistence among Ethiopia's ethnic and religious groups immediately. However, the prospect for both is enhanced by protecting human rights; and by applying the rule of law in an even handed and fair-minded manner.

Signatories wish to reiterate that going back to EPDRF's failed policy is not the way to go. It is not a wise policy. Some observes characterize this trend as "insane." Einstein defines "Insanity as doing the same thing over and over and expecting a different result or outcome." It is not wise to declare that "Revolutionary Democracy and the Constitution are non-negotiable." It is not possible to instill and institutionalize the principle of Medemer while some state and non-state actors are allowed to run a "parallel government"; and to accuse the Amhara population as "chauvinists." This accusation perpetuates a false narrative; and exposes the Amhara population for human rights abuses. Equally it is not wise or modern to claim that the Oromo should have special rights with regard to Addis Ababa, a metropolis that should belong to all Ethiopians.

Addis Ababa belongs to all Ethiopians. It should be designated as a self-governing federal city in the same manner as Abuja in Nigeria, Brasilia in Brazil and Washington D.C. in the United States.

Amhara and Oromo youth lost their lives in order to bring about justice, fairness, the rule of law and democracy to the Ethiopian people. Ethiopians deserve democracy. We therefore urge you to consider the following before the start of Ethiopia's New Year.

1. Stop the selective and ethnic-based incarceration of journalists and activists immediately and unconditionally.

2. Consider that the EPRDF government that you head has a moral obligation to learn from past mistakes; and grant amnesty and or release all journalists, youth and civic leaders, current and retired military offices, police and other prisoners of conscience immediately and unconditionally as a gesture of good will in the New Ethiopian Year.
3. Consider the notion that journalists and peaceful political and civic activists are not the cause of Ethiopia's multiple problems today. Journalists and other peaceful civic actors provide public service through the provision of reliable, more accurate and truthful information.
4. Consider the truth that the Amhara population has been demonized, dehumanized and ethnically cleansed relentlessly, unfairly and unjustly by ethnic elites; and that this assault must cease now.
5. Ponder that the "elephant in the room" is the ethnic federal and killil system that pits one ethnic group against another, creating an unstoppable spiral that may lead to civil and or religious war. The burning of churches and other places of worship is a trend that must be stopped now.
6. Deliberate please that ethno-nationalism and the vitriolic that is propagated by some individuals and groups through forums and social media is dangerous; and that propagators must be held accountable before millions of Ethiopians are displaced again and again.
7. In previous pleas, we drew your attention to the first months of your premiership in which respect for human rights and human dignity for individual persons were top on your agenda. You had begun to deal with Ethiopia's hurdles openly, with courage and boldly. You can stop possible bloodshed and man's inhumanity to man by relying more heavily on the wisdoms of the Ethiopian people, by taking bold measures; and by building strong national institutions that are solely loyal to Ethiopia and to all of the Ethiopian people.
8. Entertain the noble thought that we too are stakeholders and want the change process to succeed. We urge you to be open to fresh, innovative ideas and to alternative viewpoints and policy changes. Our intent is to strengthen Ethiopia; and to ensure that the Amhara population is no longer a target for ethnic-cleansing regardless of where the Amhara live.

9. As stakeholders we urge the EPRDF government that you lead to consider that a peaceful, inclusive, democratic and prosperous Ethiopia is in the interest of all Ethiopians. Incarcerating hundreds of Amhara youth and demonizing the Amhara population contradict inclusive development. This unfortunate and unacceptable assault inhibits or deters motivated Ethiopians like us from mobilizing our expertise and finances and channeling them to alleviate poverty and to make Ethiopia prosperous.

10. We do not have an exact account of the number of political prisoners following the assassinations in Bahir Dar and Addis Ababa and the alleged coup d'état. We are certain though that numerous leaders and members of the Amhara National Movement, the Addis Ababa Baleadera Council, journalists affiliated with Ethiopis and ASRAT that are identified below, Mrs. Desta Assefa,, the pregnant spouse of the late General Asaminew Tsige, a number of active and retired military officers, police and others are suffering in jail; and must be released now and unconditionally.

11. Atrocities that inflicted damage on citizens, including the current story of the Coup D'état that took lives and caused mass arrests must be investigated by an independent organization to provide a settlement to the victims and to the nation.

12. Finally, Ethiopia deserves to join the family of democratic nations. We therefore urge you to restore human rights and freedom of the media; and take immediate measures to stop the burning of Ethiopian Orthodox churches; and hold culprits accountable for these crimes.

We have tried to compile specific names of persons among the reported hundreds of Amhara political prisoners including merchants and farmers who have been accused unjustly; and jailed on allegations and suspicions that they had participated in the assassinations and coup d'état of June 22, 2019 in Bahir Dar and Addis Ababa.
